A very warm welcome to the Aspect Distance Education Program, via the Aspect Hunter School.

We are committed to engaging the strengths, interests and aspirations of our students. Aspect Hunter School is one of ten independent schools across Australia with a shared approach to educational practice underpinned by the Aspect Approach (AA).

Our school currently provides education for approximately 283 students on the autism spectrum across seven physical sites and 83 students in our Distance Education (DE) program. Classes are small with high teacher to student ratio with teachers aide support.

Our Distance Education program is especially beneficial for students who may find attending school challenging, as we provide dynamic and engaging learning experiences outside the

traditional classroom setting that meets each student at their specific point of need.

Students in the Distance Education program have opportunities to engage in Connection Days. These include excursions that are held off-site and incursions held at our Main Campus at Thornton. Connection Days are linked to the curriculum and tailored to meet the specific needs of each class. Students in the Distance Education program are also invited to whole school events including our Post School Options Expo, Aspect Hunter School Walkathon and the Aspect Combined Schools Sports Carnival.

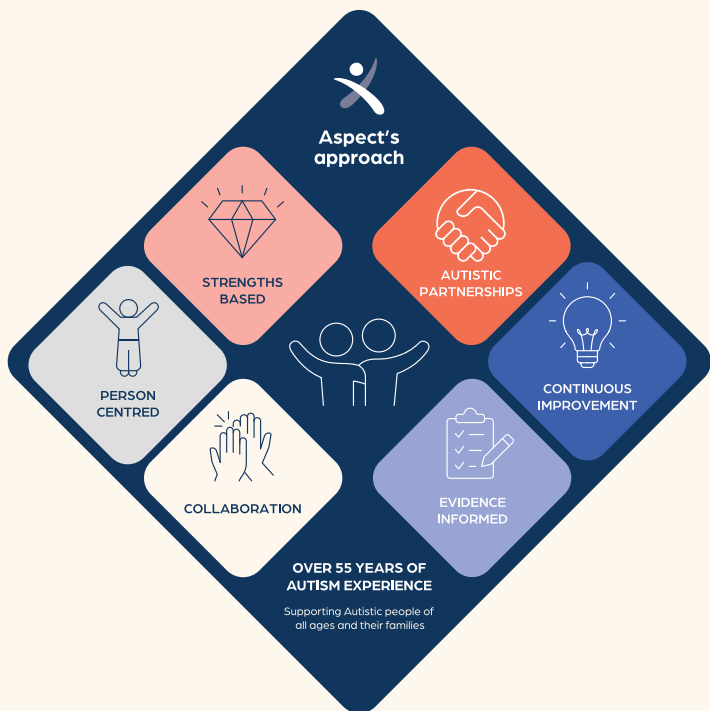
Aspect Distance Education is designed for:

- Students with a formal diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder
- Families seeking a home-based learning option
- Students in Years 3 to 12 in NSW
- NSW residents who meet school enrolment eligibility

Our Educational Approach

At the heart of Aspect Distance Education is Aspect's approach. There are 6 key principles that guide the way we deliver services:

- Autistic partnerships: We embed Autistic perspectives in everything we do, ensuring our services, research and governance are shaped by lived experiences.
- Strengths based: We focus on an individual's ability and interests.
- Person centred: We put the person at the centre of everything we do, tailoring supports and services to each individual's unique needs.
- Evidence informed: We use research to guide and shape our practices.
- Collaboration: We prioritise the views and preferences of Autistic individuals while working with their support networks to gain a well-rounded understanding of their needs, strengths and goals.
- Continuous improvement: We evaluate our practices to find ways to improve our supports and services.

What will my child learn?

PRIMARY

The Primary Distance Education program follows the New South Wales K–6 curriculum, providing students in years 3–6 with engaging and differentiated educational programs.

Key learning Areas (KLAs)

- English
- Mathematics
- Science and Technology
- Personal Development
- Creative and Performing Arts
- Human society and it's environment (HSIE) – History and Geography

SECONDARY

The Secondary Distance Education program delivers a NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) approved program that meets the mandatory curriculum requirements for Years 7–10 (RoSA), and pattern of study requirements for the Higher School Certificate (HSC– Non ATAR. Students in Years 7–10 study NESA developed courses in the following subjects:

Years 7 and 8:

- English
- Mathematics
- Science
- PDHPE

Students in Years 11 and 12 have the option to study Board Developed Life Skills courses in the following subjects:

- English Life Skill
- Mathematics Life Skills
- Food Technology Life Skills
- Visual Arts Life Skills
- Agriculture Life Skills
- Design and Technology

Where appropriate, students may elect to replace one of the above subjects (excluding English Life skills) with:

- an on-site Vocational Education and Training (VET) course (Certificate II Workplace Skills).
- a VET course with an external provider, such as TAFE.
- a School-based Apprenticeship or Traineeship (SBAT) where the training component (VET course) contributes unit credit towards the HSC.

The decision to engage in VET courses (on-site or external) or an SBAT will be made in collaboration with the school, parent/carer, student, VET teacher/provider and/or employer (for SBATs). As a non-ATAR, non-HSC exam program, each course is studied for the full four terms in each year, ensuring all courses lesson allocations exceed 120 hours per year. How the program works – at a glance

Online learning environment

Lessons and resources are delivered through secure digital platforms such as Google Classroom where students are able to access their weekly timetable, learning materials, and important updates all in one place. Students meet with their teachers and peers daily, via video conferencing within the Google Classroom platform. Students and families are able to download work, content, resources and documents through this platform as well as communicate with teachers and submit completed tasks. Students also engage in set tasks using other online learning platforms.

Personalised curriculum

- The program follows the NSW Curriculum.
- Once enrolled, each student's learning is tailored to their individual strengths, interests, and support needs.

Live and flexible teaching

- Teachers run live lessons using video modelling and digital content.

Interactive and engaging activities

- Learning includes a mix of online and offline activities.
- These may include video lessons, interactive tasks, worksheets, creative projects, and more – all designed to suit different learning styles.

Ongoing support and communication

Students and families can upload completed work and stay connected by sending messages via Seesaw and email.

Teachers also communicate with families and provide updates via the Seesaw app and email.

One-on-one check-ins can be arranged if needed, to discuss learning progress or any challenges.

The role of the Onsite Supervisor

Every student will need the support of an Onsite Supervisor who supports daily learning and liaises with teachers. An Onsite Supervisor is either a parent or an approved adult who is available during the school day. Their main role is to guide, encourage and support the student in developing independent learning skills

Support for students and families

A school Learning Support Team (LST) is available to provide support to teachers with their teaching and learning programs and individual planning for students, and to families where needed.

Aspect Hunter's Learning Support Team includes:

- Occupational Therapist
- Speech Therapist
- Family Support Officer
- Social Worker

Support includes:

- Weekly 1:1 Check-In Sessions
- Access to Aspect's Learning Support Team
- Optional Social Groups
- Connection Days

Technology requirements

Families will need:

- A laptop or desktop computer (running either Windows 110, ChromeOS or MacOS)
- Reliable internet connection (at least 1.2Mbps download and upload)
- Webcam, microphone, speakers
- Printer and scanner or camera

Required software, including Google Classroom, Zoom Video Conferencing, and others as provided for you to download and install. Other resources, such as a tablet (iPad, for example), smartphone or camera will be useful as well for students to film and photograph their work.

Fees

Aspect Online Learning is a fee-paying program. Fees are set annually and invoiced three times per year. Current fees are available on our website.

Eligibility criteria

- have a formal autism diagnosis
- they are geographically isolated or
- their individual circumstances prevent them from regularly attending school
- are Australian citizens, permanent residents of Australia or hold an eligible Australian visa

Aside from our educational program, Aspect provides a number of services that may come in handy for students and families, now or down the track.

What else does Aspect offer?

Assessments

Aspect offers autism, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and cognitive assessments in person and via telehealth. Children diagnosed early can access services that will significantly improve their prospects for a meaningful life. An assessment provides teachers and schools with information that will allow them to more effectively support your child, and you will gain a better understanding of how your child processes the world.

Aspect also offers review assessments for those already diagnosed. These assessments provide updated information about their strengths and differences, and include recommendations to assist with support planning. Such an assessment can be useful at times of transition (e.g. when commencing primary school, high school or postschool planning) or to assist in applications for funding for autism (e.g. NDIS, Disability Support Pension, school supports, etc.).

Therapy

Aspect Therapy is a registered NDIS provider with a large team of allied health professionals (speech pathologists, occupational therapists, psychologists and social workers) and educators.

Together, we develop and deliver individualised and small group autism-specific therapy and positive behaviour support.

Workshops

Aspect offers a broad range of autism-related workshops and webinars for parents, carers, educators and health professionals. We deliver practical, real-world solutions to benefit families, communities, professionals and organisations.
